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PROGRAM HISTORY

2015: Then Governor McCrory declares NC a "Vision Zero" state

2016: Began funding Vision Zero data analytics

2017: Robeson County work; Vision Zero expansion funded to involve community coalition engagement

2018: Vision Zero Community Collaborative funded; 4 VZ Communities

2019-2020: Split VZ into two projects: Community Engagement (UNC)/VZ Analytics (NC State); created milestones for VZ communities (exploration, installation, implementation); planning guide

2021: Created Statewide Task Force; first Vision Zero Leadership Institute


2024: Approximately 29 communities in some level of engagement with VZ Community Collaborative























Vision Zero in NC (2018)












Vision Zero in NC (2024)











GHSP Principles for VZ Community Collaborative

- Community Autonomy

Don't tell communities how their plans should look, but provide guidance on principles they should consider & milestones to meet

- Community engagement

Create community coalitions with a mix of professionals and members of the public as much as possible

- Information Sharing

Provide ample opportunities for coalitions to learn from each other (calls, Leadership Institute, etc)

- Use Statewide Vision Zero Task Force










The Safe System Approach


Support Model and Program Activities



















Peer Community Touchpoint Meetings

- Monthly meetings: Four groups of 4-5 communities
- Quarterly "All Hands" meetings: All communities and statewide partners (e.g., GHSP, NCDOT, ITRE)

NC Vision Zero quarterly updates

Instructions: Thinking about the previous ~3 months (since our last quarterly update), please provide updates, including any highlights or accomplishments for your community or organization and any challenges your community/organization is working through.

Emerging themes:

- assembling teams for Leadership Institute
- hiring consultants for various projects, contract negotiations
- Challenges: severe and fatal crashes, timing funding with project work, budgeting for projects, engagement on projects, coordinating multiple projects, crash data from law enforcement
- Collaboration: pairing program participation, working with fire dept, Matthews: reviewing all fatal
 accidents in a joint meeting with Police, Public Works, Fire, Park and Rec and Planning.



Statewide Task Force

Purpose: To mobilize efforts and resources to help support Vision Zero communities across NC with a focus on common challenges faced by NC Vision Zero communities; to help increase the visibility of Vision Zero across the state and better coordinate among state-level partners on Vision Zero efforts.

NC Vision Zero Leadership Institute



- **Who:** Team-based training for multisector community groups (3+ sectors)
- Format: ½ day virtual Pre-Session + 2 days in-person (Chapel Hill, NC)
- **Delivery:** speakers, panelists, team-based, facilitated activities, peer exchange, and community-building
- **Cost:** free to attend, hotel accommodations covered for all traveling 40+ miles


